2nd Annual Wisconsin 4-H Service Learning Project: Plarn Mats Project

What is plarn? It's "plastic yarn." Youth cut plastic shopping bags into loops. They knot those loops together to make plastic yarn. One youth or volunteer crochets the plarn into a mat. Reusing plastic bags helps the environment. Donated mats support individuals who are experiencing unsheltered homelessness.

Who can be part of the project? Everyone. From Kindergarten to adulthood, anyone can help. There are five project steps. Youth can help collect and sort bags, cut plastic loops, knot plarn together. They can even crochet the plarn into a mat. Youth leaders play an important role in identifying where to donate plarn or mats, leading discussions, and organizing the project.

What will the youth learn? Youth learn about homelessness through the project, going beyond stereotypes we see on television. The Explore More section encourages youth to do research and get involved. Then, they can share what they learn with others. Information and resources are included to support youth participants who know someone or are experiencing homelessness themselves.

COVID-19 Update—New Guidelines as of April 1st

Events held April 1 - June 1 have new guidance

What is changing April 1?

- 1. Number of people who can be at events or programs is increasing
 - 30% of room capacity with a maximum of 50 people allowed indoors
 - 150 people allowed for outdoor programming
- 2. Pod Size increasing to 20
 - o Groups of 20 or fewer can meet together.
 - For example a club or committee with 20 or fewer people
 - o If you have 21 or more people you will need to break into groups.
 - For example 34 people at a workshop could meet in a group of 17 and 17 or any combination that is less than 20 per group.
- 3. Maximum length of indoor events increasing to 4 hours

What continues after April 1?

- Continued Use of Face Coverings
- No Eating Indoors
- Physical Distancing (6 ft between members outside household; 20 ft between pods)
- Hand sanitizing/disinfecting requirements
- In Person Options Any face to face 4-H sponsored meeting/event/or activity needs to be preapproved.
- If your club or project would like to plan some small group activities, or a larger meeting with pods of people outside, please do the following:
 - Contact Connie to complete a Request for In-Person Programming Form.
 - Have a plan for social distancing, sanitation and using PPE (masks, etc.).



Due to the continuation of the Covid pandemic, YQCA training will only be available online this year. The Portage County Market Animal Committee has voted to cover the cost of YQCA web-based training for Rosholt Market Sale Project members for 2021.

In order to be eligible for the Rosholt Fair Market Animal Sale, you must complete this online training no later than June 1, 2021.

Once you have completed your training and receive your certificate, please email a copy to lisa.henriksen@wisc.edu so you can be given credit.

Please note, YQCA certification is required for <u>ALL</u> Rosholt Fair livestock exhibitors, not just the Market Sale Project members.

What is YQCA?

Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) is a national certification program available for youth that focuses on food safety, animal well-being and character awareness for youth ages 8 to 21 producing and/or showing pigs, beef cattle, dairy cattle, sheep, goats, market rabbits, and poultry. This interactive program replaces the (Meat Animal Quality Assurance) program.

This training will count as one of your educational requirements for the project year.

Rosholt Fair: All Beef, Sheep & Swine Exhibitors **Amherst Fair:** All Swine and Turkey Exhibitors

State Fair: Anyone Showing Beef, Dairy, Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep and Swine



MINUTES: Correction to minutes from the November 16th meeting. Duplicate statement about Pumpkin Contest Reimbursements under Pumpkin Contest Update. Motion and second to delete duplicate statement. Minutes were approved as corrected.

OFFICER REPORT: Treasurer's Report: Checking \$8657.82 Savings \$3432.81Summary of recent financial activity: \$1866.00 plat book income, \$7,000.00 expense for 350 2021 Portage County Plat Books and \$140.00 reimbursement to Connie for pumpkin and gingerbread house contests Secretary's Report: None

OLD BUSINESS: COVID-19 Update – No changes expected until status of COVID-19 is re-evaluated in April. Process for approval of a club activity has not changed. Almond Busy Bees and Tomorrow River Voyagers have asked about outdoor winter events (sledding and ice skating). Other counties have had this type of event approved. Biggest obstacle would be use of a warming house. Teen Leaders would like to sponsor a fishing contest. Connie needs to explore what safety precautions would need to be followed.

Gingerbread Contest – Huge success with 17 entries. Eight Best of Show recipients each received a \$10 certificate to Culvers. One of the Best of Show winners was a family so they were also given a clover cookie cutter. Five second place winners received \$5.00 gift certificates and 3 contestants received a lanyard and a flashlight as participation awards. Next contest will be a snow person/snow sculpture. Connie and Lisa are working on contest criteria. Dr. Barb suggested the title "No People Like Snow People".

Awards & Ambassador Interviews – Interviews were done via Zoom. Three youth, Clare L. Ciara W. and Skyler C., applied to be Ambassadors. Juniper R. volunteered to remain as an ambassador for a second year. Harleigh C. and Annika W. were selected as Leader of Tomorrow recipients and Key Awards went to Maria K., Annika W. and Clare V. There were seven applicants for the Key Award this year. Judges were Dawn VandeVoort, 4-H agent from Door County and Abigail Luerssen, daughter of an Extension staff member. Virtual interviews worked well. Will consider doing interviews virtual next year.

Plat Books – Per Lynette, Rockford will be sending postcards advertising the new edition of the plat book to all landowners with 40 or more acres of property. One side of the postcard has the 4-H information and the other side has Rockford's information. Recommendation to modify

4-H information on postcard so that the price information is all on one line. Then the size of the font for other information can be enlarged. 4-H will also receive a free full-page ad. Lisa has been working on layout for ad page. Pictures in ad are from the State 4-H. Do we need to use local pictures? If so, new ad content needs to be completed soon. No one volunteered to redo ad with county 4-H pictures. Motion by Lynette Wolosek and seconded by Pat Mrozinski to place ads for the new edition of the plat book following the same schedule used in the past. Jan asked for clarification of the motion. Does that mean we would be placing ads two time in each of the newspapers? Motion reworded to include two publication dates. Motion passed. Debra asked if it would be possible to make up an order form that could be given to 4-H families as another way to get the word out. Debra will work with Lisa to design a form. Lynette asked for volunteers to help distribute new plat books to businesses where they are sold. Dr. Barb is willing to deliver plat books to the Portage County Bank in Almond.

Virtual Programming and Contests – Suggestion has been made to have a virtual sewing project. Members and families would be charged for supplies which might cost as much as \$15. Connie's sister does mosaic projects. She could do a virtual program with tiles or mosaic. Another sister does rock tumbling. At the October meeting the Leaders Board voted to budget a total of up to \$300 for project supplies that exceed the cost charged for the project. Connie is looking for ideas and teachers for virtual educational workshops. Workshops held in the past included goats, rabbits and making bracelets. Let Connie know if you have any suggestions.

NEW BUSINESS:

4-H Virtual Awards Program – Program will be held tomorrow night, January 19th, at 6:30 PM. Alyse G. Teen Leader Past President will be the MC. Candice will be helping with the program. Lee Miller will present Key Awards. Candice, Debra and Alyse have been given access to the power point being used in program. Connie will need a check to purchase gift certificates that are given out to the Special Awards recipients.

Winter Camp – Connie is working with counties across the state to plan an all-virtual winter camp. Ozaukee County will be purchasing the supplies and collecting the registration fees. Winter camp will be held Friday night and all-day Saturday on February 12th and 13th. Today is the registration deadline. Program may be expanded to other counties if registration numbers are low.

Agri-Business Banquet – Connie talked to Karen from Agri-Business about the banquet. Tentatively the date is March 15th. If it is held in March, 4-H youth would not be able to attend. Connie will check to see if they will still select award winners in the absence of a banquet.

Club Officer Training – Connie and Candice are working with Kailei M., Cody K. and Jaclyn K. to plan and present a virtual training. Date of training is February 4th. One more planning meeting will be held prior to training. Training will include parliamentary procedure and break-out groups for the different officer positions. Jan reminded Connie that the training packet used for the Treasurer needs updating. She requested that information be sent to her so it can be revised. Connie is busy trying to keep up with all the virtual programming for awards, interviews and Market Animal Committee meetings. It is a substantial amount of paperwork and she is hopeful that nothing is lost in the process. Enrollment numbers are down. 4-H Club Meetings

Almost every 4-H club holds **regular** club meetings. Even within the same club, no two club meetings are the same. Ideally, every meeting should have three parts—**recreation** (fun), business, and learning. Youth leadership plays a huge role in the success of a club.

Most clubs have youth officers (president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and other selected roles) who are responsible for running each meeting. Youth leaders not only gain excellent life skills, they help to keep the meeting relevant and fun for members of all ages. All youth have a responsibility to contribute to their clubs through their voice and their actions!

What is my role as an adult?

Adults help create a safe, positive atmosphere for all 4-H members when they empower and encourage youth. While at a meeting, it's important to be a positive role model for everyone in attendance. Caring adults play an important role in the mental health of youth, and 4-H can help connect youth with positive adults.

Most 4-H clubs use **parliamentary procedure** to make club decisions. See if you can put the five steps of this procedure in order. Each step is written in **bold**. The answers are found at the bottom of the adult edition.

Re-state the Motion—The president restates the motion before the group votes.	1.
Discussion —The motion is discussed by all members. Members might want to bring up good or bad things about the motion, or maybe find some ways that it needs to be changed.	2
Motion—A motion is a request that something can be done. Only one motion should be placed before the group at one time. A motion can be discussed and changed.	3
Vote—The group votes to decide if they will pass or deny the motion. Voting usually happens by voice. Members say "aye" if they agree, and "nay" if they disagree. Voting sometimes happens in other ways (secret ballot, show of hands).	4. 5.
