Announcements

COVID-19 Update

As we learn more about the more infectious Delta variant of COVID-19, we continue to refine our program safety guidance in alignment with updated recommendations from the Center for Disease Control (CDC).

- For all Extension programs, we ask that individuals who are not fully vaccinated, including all youth under 12, wear a proper-fitting mask indoors.
- In counties where there is substantial or high transmission, it is strongly recommended that all individuals (regardless of vaccination status) wear a mask when indoors.
- In general, people do not need to wear masks when outdoors.
- All individuals are encouraged to wear a mask in any program setting, indoor or outdoor, if they are more comfortable doing so.
- While there is no limit on size of indoor or outdoor gatherings, maintaining 6 feet of physical distance from individuals outside your immediate household is highly recommended as a way to further reduce transmission risk. Proper handwashing and respiratory etiquette are also important measures to keep individuals and our communities healthy.

Fair Exhibitor Information

Fair Exhibitor Information

Exhibits must be set up on Thursday, September 2nd between 1:00 and 8:00 PM. All buildings close at 9:00 PM on Thursday. No exhibit will be accepted as an entry after 8:00 PM.

Exhibits require an attached entry tag. There is an exhibitor number and barcode on the top and bottom of the entry tag. Information on judging can be found on pages 3-6 of the Fair Book.

Exhibitors will receive their completed entry tags from their club's general leader. Please review them carefully to make sure they are correct. If there is an error or missing tag, call the Extension Office (715-346-1320) as soon as possible. However, changes and/or additions from your original online submission are not permitted.

Entry Tag Details

All the information is printed on a card by computer. Tear off the bottom claim check portion and keep it to pick up your exhibit on Monday. On the middle crease, fold the tag and slip it under the tab so that the exhibitor's name does not show. The barcodes will be used to enter your results digitally using scanners.

Preparing for 4-H Fair/Show Exhibits

Youth Responsibilities

4-H members need to establish a timeline to work on their 4-H projects. They should set realistic goals on what they want to accomplish and set realistic completion dates. **Be sure to read the rules and regulations outlined in the fair book.** Pay close attention to deadlines and specific requirements for each project. It may be helpful to highlight the wording in the fair book for each project in which members are enrolled.

Parent Responsibilities

Parents are encouraged to help 4-H members obtain the materials and resources needed to complete 4-H projects. Adults may answer questions, demonstrate skills, and offer guidance on project work but should not do the work themselves! Parents need to be familiar with the exhibit guidelines and judging schedules so they can help members be ready and on time for the various judging events. Adults can offer encouragement as young people prepare for judging and can provide support and reflection as youth complete the judging experience.

4-H exhibits at a fair or show are designed to showcase the work of young people to others in the community. It provides young people with the opportunity to demonstrate skills and knowledge as well as to gain ideas for improvement. 4-H members are encouraged to try something more challenging each year and to practice good sportsmanship. Exhibiting is designed to be an enjoyable educational experience, not just a contest.

What is Danish Judging?

The Danish system of judging provides more exhibitors a chance to receive a ribbon for their entries. Instead of placing only the best four exhibits and giving them a blue, red, white, or pink ribbon (like in Open Class) all entries are placed. All entries receive a premium and ribbon.

The number of blue, red, white and pink ribbons a judge hands out in any color group depends on the number of entries in the class. For example, if there are 8 entries in a Lot, up to 2 can receive a blue rating, up to 4 red ratings, up to 6 white ratings and up to 8 pink ratings.

Whose Exhibit Is It...Really?

Fair exhibits are to be made by the youth exhibiting them. The project should be the result of learning in the project throughout the year. The youth—and what they have learned—are far more important than the items they make or grow.

Parents, please do project work with your child, not for your child! Your child needs your interest, enthusiasm, advice, and help, but with that support they need to do the project themselves.

Please remember, youth do not gain if they:

- Purchase an item and show it as though it is a project they have made.
- Show a project made by another family member.
- Bring plants they did not grow, vegetables they did not plant or weed, animals they did not care for, etc.
- Exhibit a project they have shown in a previous year.

Parents—please allow your child to make and exhibit their own work, even if it does not meet your standards of quality or excellence.

Read the Fair Book Carefully!

Don't let your hard work go to waste! Read each department and class description for any instructions. The description of your lot on your FairEntry tag does <u>not</u> contain all the information you need to show. The judges will be looking to make sure the fair book rules and requirements were observed!

ATTENTION – Rosholt Fair Cake Decorating Exhibitors

The Cake Auction at the Rosholt Fair will be Friday night, **September 3rd at 6:30 pm.** Cakes may be brought in from 1:00 – 8:00 pm on Thursday.

All cake auction exhibitors are encouraged to be present at the cake auction. If you are unable to be present because of time conflicts with your animal exhibits, etc., it is permissible to have someone else stand in for you as a substitute with the agreement that they turn the money over to you. You need to indicate that you will have a stand in on the form you fill out on Thursday.

What is the Judge Looking For?

While it is not possible to anticipate all of the things a particular judge will be looking for in a fair exhibit, it is possible to learn about the standards of excellence for each project and also for common types of county fair exhibits.

To find out the standards for your projects, carefully read your project literature, talk to your leader, participate in workshops and contact the Extension Office if you have any questions.

SCRAPIE REMINDER

To exhibit your sheep and goats at the fairs, you must follow our animal health rules. Sheep & Goats originating from within Wisconsin: All sheep and goats of any age must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official scrapie identification. Sheep & goats exposed to scrapie will not be allowed. Sheep & Goats originating from outside Wisconsin: Must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. All sheep & goats must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official scrapie identification. To obtain official scrapie ear tags and applicator, call the USDA Veterinary Services Office toll-free at 866-873-2824.

RECORD BOOKS



Contact your GENERAL LEADER for the deadline to turn in your record book! Record books will be judged for the AWARDS PROGRAM which will be held SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 14th, at the Jensen Center, Amherst, 1:00 to 2:00 P.M.

Why Do A Record Book?

4-H Record Books will help you keep track of the achievements and activities that you participate in throughout your 4-H career. The information on the project record sheets may be used to fill out applications for awards, trips, scholarships, and resumes. The information will help you put into writing your accomplishments, recording your growth and development in 4-H.

The following items may be included in the Record Book IN THIS ORDER:

- 1. Front & Back Cover filled out and up to date.
- 2. <u>Portage County 4-H Member Permanent Record Sheets</u> Completed each September 15 through September 14 of the current 4-H year.
- 3. <u>Cover Sheet (optional)</u> Picture of youth (optional but nice), name, age, club, or whatever the youth wants to include about themselves. Should be placed after the Portage County 4-H Member Permanent Record Sheets.
- 4. <u>Table of Contents (optional)</u> Can be simple with just projects and year listed across from project page numbers are not needed.
- 5. 4-H Activity Sheet September 15 through September 14 of the current 4-H year.
- 6. <u>Activity Pictures* & Newspaper Clippings</u> Place following activity sheet. One picture per activity recommended (not more than 2 per activity). Newspaper clippings should pertain to activity.
- 7. Youth Leadership Project Sheet Suggested one picture or sketching per article or item. Place form right after Activity Sheets and Pictures. When applying for a SPECIAL COUNTY AWARD, member must be enrolled in the 4-H Youth Leadership Project, but does not need to be a Youth Leader in the project for which they are applying for an award.
- 8. <u>Project Sheets</u> Member must have at least one project sheet for each project they are enrolled in. Some project sheets have room for two projects, one on the front and one on the back, like the PR-Home Form (ex., put pillow made on front page and drawing on back page).

- 9. <u>Project Pictures & Newspaper Clippings</u> Place following project sheet. One picture per project recommended (not more than 2 per project). Newspaper clippings should pertain to project.
- 10. Market Animal Sheet Can be a supplement to project sheet not in place of sheet.
- 11. No loose papers.
- 12. Record Books may be either typed or handwritten, but must be your own work.


*<u>Pictures</u>: Pictures are great if built into a little story to help explain your project work. However, too many pictures make a photo album, not a Record Book (one picture recommended - not more than two). Use pictures only about you and your project.

<u>If you are the Club Secretary, what does your Secretary's book need?</u>

The following forms in the Club Secretary Book must be completed: Attendance Record Sheet, Officer Summary Sheet, Club Calendar, monthly Minutes (in order), and Club Evaluation Form. Financial Sheet is optional.

What Is NOT Needed In Record Book:

- 1. <u>No</u> ribbons, letters, certificates, program booklets, score sheets, etc. . . are to be put in your Record Book. These items belong in a scrapbook for your memories!
- Last year's records are <u>not needed</u> and <u>will not</u> be considered. They may be left in the record book or taken out at the discretion of the youth.
- 3. Newspaper clippings **not** related to project/activity.
- 4. Do <u>not</u> include any other project books or literature in the Record Book.
- 5. Do not include Exploring Posters.

Beyond the Club

You're a part of something big! 4-H is the nation's largest youth development organization, with more than 6 million members and over 90,000 clubs. Because of how big 4-H is, it can be hard to understand where you (and everyone else) fits into the greater scope of 4-H from a state and national level.

Wisconsin 4-H

The 4-H Program Management team directs state 4-H program. State 4-H Program Specialists provide resources for educational areas.

Area Extension Director

The Area Extension Director (AED) supervises county-level Extension staff and fosters the relationship between state and the county partners.

Did you know?

Nationally, 4-H is administered by the National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA) of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). Each state's 4-H program reports to the USDA annually.

County-Based 4-H Staff

County staff work in the local Extension office. Staff provide education, supervision, and administration for the county 4-H program.

What is Extension?

Extension is a division of UW-Madison that brings the resources of the University to people where they live and work. Extension program areas include youth, family, and community development as well as agriculture & natural resources.

Chartered 4-H Clubs

4-H clubs meet regularly, and members work with adults together toward a common purpose. While community clubs are most common, clubs can also be found in afterschool, inschool, and military settings.

Chartered 4-H Groups

4-H groups meet regularly, focus on a specific educational goal, and are open to 4-H members throughout the county. Examples of groups are a countywide Dog Project or a Shooting Sports Program.

Chartered 4-H Leaders Organizations

Leaders Organizations conduct countywide events, fundraise, coordinate recognition, and advocate for 4-H in the community.

If your child wants to get more involved with 4-H beyond the club level, check with your club leader or your county-based 4-H staff to learn about additional 4-H opportunities.
