<u>Introduction to Lego Robotics (Grades 4-12)* This class is for BEGINNERS or FAMILIES</u>

We will meet at the Portage County Library and be using LEGO MINDSTORMS EV3, the Third generation of robotics products from the LEGO group. These robots will introduce entry-level robotics with state-of-the art hardware and easy-to-use programming software. In this robotics workshop series youth will spend three sessions building and programing the LEGO MINDSTORMS Robots. From using light sensors, touch sensors, ultrasonic sensors to

using sound sensors. Youth grades 4-12 will use their critical thinking

skills. Space is limited. Five Robotic Kits are available.



4-H TEEN AMBASSADOR & AWARDS REMINDER

Award/ambassador applications are due Dec. 15! Award interviews will be held on Jan. 6th.

We will be accepting applications and interviewing for the 4-H Ambassador Delegates, Key Award, and Leader of Tomorrow Award. Copies of the Award/Ambassador application are available at https://portage.extension.wisc.edu/ (under the 4-H Forms and Applications page).

4-H AMBASSADOR: The Ambassador term will start in March. Ambassadors will serve an active term of one year but will also be an associate member of Ambassadors for the duration of their 4-H membership. Requirements: Must be in 6th grade or higher; must exhibit leadership ability and potential; must exhibit personal appearance and poise; must exhibit knowledge of 4-H. When: 4-H Ambassadors serve a one-year term beginning in March. They will be recognized in October at the end of their career at the 4-H Leaders Banquet. Maximum Number: Up to 4 Ambassadors are chosen. Duties: Present the 4-H story at community activities and events and promote 4-H. Responsibilities: Hand out ribbons and trophies at the Amherst and Rosholt Fairs; participate in the Amherst and Rosholt Fair parades; make presentations to groups (we will train you); presentation of flags and pledges at the 4-H Leaders' Banquet and Award program; help with the 4-H Awards Program; be available to represent 4-H at other events during the year.

WISCONSIN KEY AWARD: Requirements: Must be in at least 10th grade of the current year, have at least 3 years' experience in 4-H and 1 year of enrollment in the Youth Leadership project.

Maximum Number: Up to 3 recipients. This is the highest state 4-H award offered. It is based on all 4-H work done by the member since joining 4-H, including youth leadership.

LEADERS OF TOMORROW AWARD: Requirements: Must in at least 11th grade, and exhibit leadership ability and potential. Maximum Number: Up to 2 recipients. Recognizes character, balanced personal development, and excellence in leadership.

If you would like to become a 4-H leader, you are required to attend a two-hour orientation/ training, complete a background check through the state's background check system, and complete an online mandatory reporter training.

The orientation will help you learn more about 4-H and your role as a volunteer, to strengthen your understanding of how to work with youth, and to encourage safe practices.

Note: The mandatory reporter training must be completed before you attend the New Volunteer Training. You can find training materials under the "trainings" tab of your 4H Online account.

The Portage County Land and Water Conservation Committee and staff encourage you to enter either or both of the 2022 contests. The theme for the 2022 Conservation Poster Contest is "Healthy Soil Healthy Life". Poster contest divisions are: Grades K-1, 2-3, 4-6, 7-9, and 10-12. Posters are due in the Land and Water Conservation office by 4:30 p.m. on Friday, Dec. 17th.

The deadline to register for the Conservation Speech Contest is Friday, Dec. 17 at 4:30 p.m. Speeches will be performed and judged at the Land and Water Conservation Committee meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 4, at 6:00 p.m. Speaking Contest divisions are: Elementary - grades 5-6 (3-5 minute speech), Junior - grades 7-8 (4-6 minute speech), and Senior – grades 9-12 (5-7 minute speech). Speeches must promote the conservation of natural resources and the protection or enhancement of environmental quality.

Awards are given for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd places in each division for each contest. First place finishers in each contest advance to the Area contest, then the State contest. Awards vary at each contest.


