Topics covered will include: review of materials needed for initial sewing kit, introduction and practice with sewing machine.

SESSION 2: SEWING MACHINE

May 1, 2022 1:00-2:00pm

Topics covered will include: introduction of sewing finishes and pressing techniques and construction of a sachet or pillow case.

SESSION 3: SEWING PATTERNS

May 22, 2022 1:00-2:00pm

Topics covered will include: learning how to read and apply a pattern to material, pinning, cutting, and assembling pajama/lounge pants.

SESSION 4: SEWING PROJECT COMPLETION

June 5, 2022 1:00-2:00pm

What is YQCA?

Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) is a national certification program available for youth that focuses on food safety, animal well-being and character awareness for youth ages 8 to 21 producing and/or showing pigs, beef cattle, dairy cattle, sheep, goats, market rabbits, and poultry.

This training will count as one of the educational credits for Market Animal Project members.

Who is YQCA Required for?

Rosholt Fair: All Beef, Sheep & Swine Exhibitors (not just the market sale project members)

Amherst Fair: All Swine and Turkey Exhibitors

State Fair: Anyone Showing Beef, Dairy, Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep and Swine

YQCA training will only be available online this year and will cost \$12. Portage County will not be holding a face-to-face YQCA training this year and the Rosholt Fair Market Animal Committee will not be sponsoring coupons to cover the cost of training.

Please note that in order to be eligible to participate in the Rosholt Fair Market Animal Sale you must complete your training no later than <u>July 1, 2022</u>.

Market Animal Project Members: once you have completed your training and receive your certificate, please email a copy to lisa.henriksen@wisc.edu so you can be given credit.

Portage County 4-H Leaders Association - January 2022

The Portage County 4-H Leaders Association meeting of 1-17-22 held via Zoom was called to order by President, Betty Pionek at 6:32 pm. Pledges were recited and roll call was taken.

PRESENT: Marilyn Pederson (Carson Climbers), Kathy Glodowski, Malayna Polum and Michelle Waltenberg, (Nelsonville Zippy Zees), Betty Pionek, Bonnie Ziolkowski and Pat Mrozinski (Casimer Boosters), Debra Helbach and Karen Jastromski (Tomorrow River Voyagers), Sharon Cisewski (Plover Clovers), Barb Kasprowicz (Almond Busy Bees), Jan Miller (Rosholt Pioneers), Agnes Mallek (Junction City Golder Stars) and Connie Creighton, 4-H Youth Development Agent. ADDITONS TO AGENDA: Plat Book Ads, Plant Sale, 2021 Volunteer of the Year Award and Cook Books MINUTES: Minutes were approved as corrected.

OFFICER REPORTS: Treasurer's Report: Checking \$24,927.47 Savings \$3,584.71 | Plat Book Sales: November \$1240 (31) and December \$1046 (26) | Received \$50 donation from Jason and Jennifer Kressin of Gleason, WI | Secretary's Report and Correspondence: None

OLD BUSINESS: COVID-19 Update – No changes for clubs. Wearing masks for indoor events is no longer mandatory but still recommended. | Gingerbread Contest – Contest was a big success. The 42 entries are being judged. The information about the Snow Man Contest was sent out today. | Roller Skating Party – Jan reported that there was only one evening date available for a skating party this year. The party was held the day before New Year's Eve. Attendance was less than in the past. A total of 32 youth and adults skated and shared pizza, ice cream and soda as a group. Difference in fees collected and cost of the party and insurance resulted in a \$2.20 cost to the Leaders Association. | Trips and Awards – Jessica Oliver was selected as 4-H Ambassador. | Juniper Rydberg, Harleigh Carlson and Zachary Kolodziej were selected as Key Award winners. | Maria Kildahl and Zachary Kolodziej were selected as Leaders of Tomorrow. | Other: Plat Book Ads – Per Jan, the Rosholt Record charges the 4-H \$29 for a 2 ½ by 2½ inch ad. The ad print listing the names of the businesses that sell plat books is so small, a magnifying glass is needed to read it. In the past, the Rosholt Record has charged \$50 for a larger ad. The Community Spirit only charges \$31 for a much larger ad. Jan recommends that in the future, we do not advertise in the Rosholt Record. Debra pointed out that the Community Spirit is very supportive of all 4-H programs and events and encourages 4-H clubs to send in pictures and articles to Brent Frankenhoft, Community Spirit Editor. She also shared information about a Jensen Center maintenance supervisor, Chris Pehoski, who is currently receiving cancer treatments. Marilyn will send a card.

NEW BUSINESS: Charter Training: Learn Together, Lead Together: 2021 Annual Leader Training- One youth or adult leader from each club is required to attend a charter training session. Two Virtual trainings were scheduled. The first was held on November 30th and the second training will be held January 31st from 6:30 to 8:00 pm. | Jensen Center Concession Stand – April 9th: Leaders Association has been asked to provide refreshments for the Annual Tomorrow River Variety Show in April. Debra expects there to be a bigger turnout than there was for the previous entertainer's show that we provided refreshments for. Last time we had a variety of baked goods and beverages. Betty recommended that we limit baked goods to finger foods such as bars and cookies. She will work with Mariah from the Jensen Center to come up with a menu. Details will be published in the Courier. | Winter Camp – Originally scheduled for 2 days but has been changed to a one-day camp due to COVID. Date of camp is Saturday, January 29th. So far, a total of 40 youth from multiple counties (Winnebago, Waupaca, Langlade, Lincoln, Marathon, Wood, Shawano, Portage) have signed up. Cost for camp will probably be \$35.00. | American Spirit Scholarship Request – Per written request from Kaydence Burclaw, she had been signed up for the previous American Spirit trip, but was unable to attend because it was cancelled due to COVID. She is signed up to go this year and is asking for financial support from the Leaders Association. Per Jan, out of state trip funding has not been in the Leader Association budget for the past three years. Our current checkbook balance is not a good indication of the financial status for the Leaders Association. For the past three years, our expenses have exceeded our income even though we did not help fund the out of state trips. This is a trend that will continue unless we add another large fundraiser that will generate the income that the plat books used to generate. If we help fund one youth, we will be setting a precedent for future applicants. Dr. Barb has a club member that was interested in attending but did not apply because of lack of funding. The following comments were made: Vote would be needed to add to budget; signup deadline has passed which prevents sign up of other youth who might have signed up if they knew financial assistance would be provided; per, Connie, no vote would be required since funding was not include in the budget. Recommendation that youth interested in attending trips consider other sources for financial assistance such as the 4-H Foundation and their local club.

Cost of kits was \$300 per kit. | Virtual Contests – Current contest is the Snowman Building Contest. Entries are due Friday, February 12th. Due to its popularity last year, Connie plans to have another Peeps Contest in the spring. | Portage County Scholarships - Scholarship application forms will be in the February/March Courier. Scholarship committee volunteers are Jan Miller, Pat Mrozinski, Kathy Glodowski and Betty Pionek. | Other: Plant Sale – Jan contacted Patty at Karthauser right after New Year's Day and requested an updated plant list and pricing for this year by the end of February we could distribute order forms by the first week in March. The green house expects there will be a slight increase in their pricing due to the increased cost of supplies. | 2021 4-H Volunteer of the Year Award - Debra Helbach is the recipient of the 2021 4-H Volunteer of the Year Award. Making Memories at the Fair



Going to and exhibiting at the fair is often a major highlight for 4-H youth. For some youth, that may be participating in their community, county, or regional fair. For others, that may mean exhibiting at the Wisconsin State Fair. No two fairs are the same, but they do share the opportunity for 4-H members to show their accomplishments.

Who organizes the fair?

The Wisconsin Association of Fairs and DATCP (Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection), gives leadership to county fair boards and associations. Those local entities are responsible for organizing the fair. Most fairs have volunteers who serve in roles called superintendents. They serve as a valuable link between the fair and the exhibitors to make sure judging goes smoothly and answer questions related to exhibit scoring. Please be kind to the superintendent—they freely give their time to help the fair and your child.

How to help your 4-H member find success

- Be prepared. Read the premium book and get to know fair entry rules for your 4-H member's exhibits. Check with your local fair for their premium book and exhibitor rules.
- Make it **educational**. Ask your 4-H member questions about their project(s). Helping youth reflect on their work can also help them prepare to exhibit.
- Keep everything in perspective and be supportive. Even if the color of the ribbon wasn't what your exhibitor was looking for, you can help them focus on what they learned in the process.
- Have **fun** and **make memories!** The fair is full of opportunities that will stick with your family for a long time. Adults can help make sure that it is a positive experience for youth.

Fairs and exhibits may use different kinds of judging to assess exhibits. Becoming familiar with these types of judging can help your youth have a more positive experience. Learn more: How Fair Entries are Judged
