The Rosholt Fair will be using the same online system as last year: **FairEntry**. Instructions for setting up your account and adding entries are on the next page.

All entries are due in the system by Friday, July 22nd!

- 4-H exhibitors will sign up for exhibits using their 4-H Online Account information. Exhibitors will be able to indicate whether they want to show an entry through their 4-H club or FFA chapter.
- Cloverbuds do not add entries; they can just bring their exhibit to the fair. You do not need to add them to your family's account.
- If you need computer assistance, feel free to set up an appointment to use a computer and add entries at the Portage County Extension Office (715-346-1462).

Many exhibits have size requirements or special instructions, such as including a 3x5" card with information about the exhibit.

Peeps Contest has started. | Other: Plat Books – Only 6 books left in the 4-H Office. Books have been ordered 3 times for a total of 650 books. Money for the sale of 526 has been deposited leaving 124 unsold books. Jan will get updates from Lynette, Debra and Karen in regards to number of unsold books at their sale locations. | Charter Training – Connie does not have an update for the online charter training for 2022. She will let clubs know if any information required for the training is missing. NEW BUSINESS: Jensen Center Concession Stand-April 9th – Event begins at 7:30 pm. Betty is coordinating the sale. Approximately 100 are expected to attend. Still need more adults and youth to help. Also looking for donors for cookies, brownies, popcorn and water. | Plant Sale – Brochures were printed and ready for pick-up on March 3rd. Due date for club orders is April 5th. Pete and Laina have agreed to let us use their building to sort and distribute plants again this year. Tentative delivery date is May 14th. Price that greenhouse charges us for the plants has increased approximately 10%. | Cook Book Fundraiser – Betty and Malayna are looking into the production of a Portage County 4-H Cook Book. They will need seed money to proceed since a cook book was not a budget item. There was a consensus that this is a good idea. Debra suggested that the cookbook could be a fall fundraiser. Decisions need to be made about how many recipes to include, cover design and whether to include club histories. Process will take a long time so should start working on it now. Need to collect recipes from club members. | Portage County Scholarships – Only two applicants this year, Annika Waltenberg and Emily Hauer. Applications was read by the committee members who determined that both are worthy applicants. Connie will be sending them a letter. Speaking and Demonstration Contests – Scheduled for April 4th at the Portage County Library. Only able to schedule a judge for one night so will hold both contests the same night. | 4-H Tech Changemakers - Connie is recruiting to add to the current group. She has already added one new member. Group has done one presentation at the Lodge. The Lodge has requested a second presentation. | Clothing Review – Nothing planned at this time. There is no longer a time restriction to complete the Clothing Review before the State Fair. Need new location. Library does not have a good area for youth to change garments in. County Annex can only be used for county business. Suggestions for new location were Jensen Center which has a \$30.00 rental fee and the Kennedy School in Junction City. Per Marilyn, contact for Kennedy School is Julie Granger. Let Connie know if you have any ideas about date, time and location of contest. | Donations – Bob Petersen, Almond farmer, left \$225,000 to the Almond Busy Bees 4-H Club when he passed away. State 4-H staff will help the club decide how to handle the money. Almond Busy Bees past and present club leaders and club officers will be meeting to discuss how to proceed. Jerry Gadamus, retired local arist, donated 51 signed and numbered prints of "More Milk Please" (3 calves faces) to the Portage County 4-H program. Prints are being stored at Koerten Gallery due to need for climate-controlled storage area. Prints are valued at approximately \$75.00 each. Need to find out cost of framing several prints that could be sold during the Market Animal Sale or the Cake Auction. Images of prints could be displayed on the internet. | Summer Intern – Program discontinued due to lack of county funding. Will need more 4-H volunteers to help with summer programs such as the food stand. | Summer Camp – Junior Camp will be held at CWES on June 10-11 for grades 3 and 4 (no Cloverbuds this year). Intermediate Camp will be held at Upham Woods on June 12th-14th. In need of youth counselors and adult chaperones. Penny and Connie will be checking on cost of busing. Cost will be \$35.00 per camper. | Title IX - Online training about prevention and reporting of sexual misconduct required by UW Madison in order for the university to be in compliance with State requirements. Will take about 25 minutes to complete. Training must be completed by April 15th. 4-H leaders who will be chaperones are also required to complete mental health training. All leaders should have received an email about training on March 14th. Connie will mail information about training to Agnes and Marilyn. | Other: Ambassador T-Shirts - Jan suggested that past and present ambassadors be provided with an ambassador t-shirt that could be worn anywhere at any time. Educational Experiences

Protection is a **Priority**

For some young people, 4-H experiences are the first time they are away from home for an extended period of time. Youth safety, both physical and mental, are the top priority for Wisconsin 4-H. All experiences have at least one adult for every ten youth. Chaperones are a mix of 4-H professionals and trained, vetted volunteers committed to ensuring a positive experience for youth. Youth participate in an orientation prior to the experience to help them prepare and to give ample time to answer questions from youth and adults.

The Wisconsin 4-H Foundation may provide some funding to help offset the total cost of educational experiences for 4-H members. Many county Leader Organizations also provide financial support for participating members. If you have concerns about the cost of participating, talk with your local 4-H educator about options that may be available.
